



Mobile Money Snapshot:

Use Cases of Mobile Financial Services in Bangladesh (by Beneficiary)

USAID promotes increased access to and usage of mobile financial services in order to deepen financial inclusion, accelerate broad-based economic growth, and instill transparency into funding flows. These snapshots describe the experiences of USAID- and non-USAID-funded organizations that have begun to replace cash with digital payments so that others can apply their lessons learned to their own transition to digital payments.

This document illustrates some of the different ways that mobile financial services (MFS) are being used with different types of beneficiaries in Bangladesh. It intends to help USAID's implementing partners learn more about how mobile financial services are being and have been used across different projects and programs implemented by government agencies, private sector players and development organizations. The list provided here is not exhaustive and is meant to provide a general idea of some of the different ways that MFS is currently being used in contexts similar to the types of payments made by USAID IPs.
