Dick Tinsley: So the government was supervising the farmers not collaborating with the farmers!!

Laura Meissner: yes

Laura Meissner: we can hear you

Hailu Teka: I can hear you well.

Dick Tinsley: Was the fixed price of bread a floor price as in the USA or ceiling price designed to promote low urban prices at the expense of the farmers?

April Thompson - Microlinks: Thanks for your question, Dick, duly noted.

Gary Alex: Weren't wheat varieties preserved in international seed banks somewhere?

Dick Tinsley: They should be at CIMMYT or in Fort Collins, or Norway

April Thompson - Microlinks: Hi Gary - good to see you here!

Hailu Teka: No subsidy now but would people in the production area be able to buy? Can they afford to buy products given the current economic crisis?

April Thompson - Microlinks: Thanks for everyone's questions - please keep them coming and they will be addressed after both of our speakers.

Dick Tinsley: ICARDA was a victim of the war

Claire Durham: How do you ensure you pick the correct points along the value chain, and enough of them to ensure the programme is successful?

Ben Ersing: Is there an access to finance component in strengthening the private sector?

Adam Ahmed - USAID Microlinks: Great questions Claire and Ben, we will address them during the Q and A portion of this presentation

Tom Shaw: Are you looking at a crop insurance component given the larger risk of the continuing conflict?

Ahmad Alkasir: Think the government will always be able to offer competitive prices that are hard to beat given that Syria exports durum (hard wheat), and replaces it with less expensive soft wheat

Dick Tinsley: You have mentioned the production inputs how about the operational needs such as mechanization cost

Ahmad Alkasir: thus, they make some money to compensate for the subsidies

Gary Alex: If the government quits dictating what a farmer is to plant, is there any indication that farmers would switch from wheat to higher value more profitable products?

Indra Klein: Re: govt control -- to what degree has economic inequality been considered? (Consider efforts in Central America in '90's)

Ahmad Alkasir: Gary, think water availability is the major factor to consider. Given that wheat can be grown rain-fed, think wheat will always prevail

Angeline Ndabaningi: thank you for the opportunity to learn from Syria

Dick Tinsley: How much of the farmers' limited energy and labor should be allocated to animal vs. crop management? In Ethiopia it was about 50/50. <http://smallholderagriculture.agsci.colostate.edu/ethiopia-diet-analysis/>

Indra Klein: Given cultural mores, how are women-led households/businesses faring; & to what degree are their efforts hindered?

Adam Ahmed - USAID Microlinks: YES! Love James Bond!

Eugenie Catta: Thanks Ziad!

Indra Klein: With regard to displacement, what steps have been taken to (1) contain resentments/suspensions & create environments of trust & respect during processes?

Angeline Ndabaningi: connection is really bad from my side. is there a way of accessing the audio/visual even after this webinar

Mumino Kamara: Weekend farmers market can develop poultry and also create a port for trade

marydean purves: not lear on the 'partnership' btw vulnerable HH and (3) 'agent'...

Angeline Ndabaningi: thanks

marydean purves: rabbits are very fragile to initiate!

Ahmad Alkasir: Is there a market for rabbits? Would people eat rabbit meat in target areas?

Ziad Ayoubi: I assume no

Ahmad Alkasir: I thought so

Joe Chal: rabbits had a food security objective in this case

Joe Chal: it was used as an alternative fodder, already in practice in these besieged areas

Hamsha Pathmanathan : hi everyone! I'm doing something similar in post war Sri Lanka, but focused in the paddy sector. I'm looking at implementing agroforestry systems to increase soil fertility, improve harvests, and increase food security in the North. Would appreciate any input/suggestion to resources to this project sustainable

Ziad Ayoubi: so far looks more like a food security project that has a humanitarian nature rather than market system intervention.

Ahmad Alkasir: broiler chickens will do better than rabbits

SHERI ARNOTT: was a gender analysis done? If so, what were some key issues that came up

Dick Tinsley: what is the conversion ratio for rabbits? That should be the key to what you should promote although you have a major promotion problem for rabbits

indra klein: As the program further develops, are you incorporating financial lit components, as well as training that fosters collective bargaining for small producers?

April Thompson - Microlinks: We'll be wrapping up soon and going to Q&A so please do type any lingering questions here!

Ziad Ayoubi: can we get the value chain analysis?

Lene Hansen: Building on Ziad's comment: sustainability of this intervention?? And why is lending constrained - were MFIs linked in?

indra klein: How are you using mobile tech & social media to raise awareness, train/educate and motivate behaviours that effect desired change?

Lene Hansen: adding to indra's comment: and for price info

Trina Chase: Is it possible to get a copy of the powerpoint and audio to share with others on my team?

indra klein: Thoughts on intergenerational perspectives --practices and behaviors that may create better paths for sustainability?

Rabih Yazbeck: Can you please elaborate further on the lending constraints and if you are aware of some pilots or successful lending interventions in this context?

Mumino Kamara: I need some improved customer service relations tools and KSF key support facts

hamza hamwie: Hi Laura, could you please raise your voice

April Thompson - Microlinks: Hamza, she is a bit under the weather so turn up your computer volume if you can :)

SHERI ARNOTT: really appreciate the candor in your presentation, Viadehi

Laura Meissner: Yes, sorry Hamza, I have a bad cold. Normally I am louder!

hamza hamwie: Thank you, much appreciated your great effort and wish to be better

Ahmad Alkasir: privatisation of wheat value chain and introduction of cost-recovery in such a context might be associated with out-of-control bread prices, which might not be favourable for food security

indra klein: Are there any efforts in developing a campaign -- whether govt, biz assns or producer collectives to raise awareness globally & encourage consumers to buy products produced in areas of conflict, as away to foster global humanitarian support, esp with use of mobile tech and social media?

indra klein: From a funding perspective, thoughts on leveraging resources with use of social media & mobile tech, esp targeted at millenials?

Dick Tinsley: how much of the fertilizer for wheat was diverted to other more profitable crops?

Ahmad Alkasir: The wheat prices, pre-crisis, were higher than those of the global market. So farmers benefited

indra klein: Based on current data, what % of revenue (on avg) is put back into biz/production? Thoughts on % towards savings? meeting living needs? If not yet known, any plans to obtain data in future survey?

Ahmad Alkasir: the game was that durum wheat (80% of Syrian wheat is durum), has a higher value than soft wheat used for making bread

Dick Tinsley: durum wheat is usually preferred for pasta

April Thompson - Microlinks: Ahmad, thanks for clarifying that!

Ahmad Alkasir: exactly

marydean purves: Indra's question is really key... investment versus subsistence...

April Thompson - Microlinks: Thanks, Marydean - we will get to it.

indra klein: Is there a game plan with regard to time frame when govt will lessen its control?

Marisa Ferri 2: Greetings from USDOL! Here are two great companies in the MENA region offering online employment. Great opportunities for Syrians, especially tech savvy youth. Marisa Ferri 2: (This is Christine Carlson-Ajlani)

Lene Hansen: Postal banks were quite widespread pre-crisis? Jamaiyats relatively widespread in South. FMFB-S and UNRWA MFP still active in Syria. Have you actually been intouch with them?

April Thompson - Microlinks: Interesting, Marisa, thank you for sharing that lead.

April Thompson - Microlinks: Thanks for your question, Lene - we have a lot to cover here but we'll note it!

indra klein: alas...have no idea what is being said due to echo-effect and bouncing...looking forward to recording

April Thompson - Microlinks: Sorry to hear, Indra - I know that's often an issue for you but rest assured we will share this out soonest!

indra klein: thank you...today's session is a very much needed presentation

Ahmad Alkasir: Expectedly. Wheat is easy to grow

April Thompson - Microlinks: We'll be wrapping up questions soon, so do give us your feedback on this presentation via the polls on your screen.

Mumino Kamara: The Halal market can improve the market reach and als some Arabic language fluency can improve scenarios atleast 70%

Dick Tinsley: Ahman, thus the farmers are mostly interested in thier return to labor

Ahmad Alkasir: Does that imply that abolishing subsidies will end wheat farming?

Dick Tinsley: not if the wheat is openly marketed instead of controlled market

Ahmad Alkasir: openly, means exporting it. Right?

Dick Tinsley: no open within the country, just not controlled with a ceiling price

Ahmad Alkasir: But durum wheat is mostly exported.

Ahmad Alkasir: It will have a small market

Dick Tinsley: in that case they might shift to a bread wheat as open market will increase the price received

Ahmad Alkasir: unless we are planning on a multi-decade policy shift towards soft wheat instead of durum wheat

marydean purves: Vai, well said re the younger generation and how to attract them to stay/return to their community...even in non-crisis, conflict countries this is a huge challenge in ag/rural communities.

Dick Tinsley: In response to a positive market structure for hard red, the conversion would be a few years rather than decades

Lene Hansen: ACTually, we're seeing refugees return to Syria from neighbouring countries now...with potential skills/experience from other markets, including women with vocational skills.

indra klein: From a program perspective, thoughts on how you are rethinking donor participation, esp when considering tech and entrepreneurial components merging/improving farming/livestock production practices?

Ahmad Alkasir: I can't give a precise estimate, but I guess things like availability of seeds to the satisfy the increasing deman for soft wheat, in addition to adapting the whole wheat natural eco-system (varieties, micro-climates, pests etc), will take a very long time. Dick

indra klein: Thank you for a very thought-provoking presentation -- time well spent!

Dick Tinsley: If you allow for market seed a introduced variety can blanket an area in 3 seasons starting with only 1 kg of seed. The multiple factor for wheat is 1 to 50. wheat is self pollenated so little change in gentic quality with different generations
