Innovating for Change

Stuart L. Hart, from Cornell's Johnson Graduate School of Management and one of the world's leading authorities on sustainable business strategies, will share breakthrough insights on the new generation of *base of the pyramid* (BoP) strategies. After a decade of BoP experimentation, there is a growing concern that corporate BoP strategies represent nothing more than "veiled attempts to sell to the poor," as if simply turning the poor into "consumers" will address the fundamental problems of poverty. Innovative solutions are needed. Dr. Hart will present new approaches to deal with these challenges using an "embedded" form of business co-creation and other community-based processes for commercializing green technologies at the BoP. This new generation of BoP strategies will advance sustainable agriculture, increase food security, and lay the foundation for transformative change.

Market Development Initiatives Promoting Food Security

Market-driven approaches to dealing with the challenges of rising food insecurity are increasingly integrated into development portfolios. Panelists will discuss issues such as analyzing systems to identify critical constraints, working through the private sector, designing deliberate exit strategies, effective use of subsidies, identification of leverage points, and facilitator-driven methodologies. This session will explore several examples of successful market development programs and strategies. Participants will be asked to discuss lessons learned, and how the approaches might be replicated in other market contexts to achieve food security objectives.

Linking Finance to Food Security: Approaches, Products, and Tools

Commonwealth North 2

Historically, financial services have played a limited role in programs that increase food availability and poor families' access to it. This situation is due in large part to the strong focus by MFIs on microcredit for small, mostly non-agricultural businesses. The growing evidence that poor families need, and want, safe savings and affordable risk management strategies is dramatically changing the role of financial services in food security programs. Index-based weather insurance offers the prospect of protecting crops against the effects of drought or floods, just as progress in managing weather risks has the potential to radically change the dynamics of rural finance. Such insurance can protect the financial institution's agricultural credit portfolios, and may result in more and cheaper loans for agricultural inputs. This session will explore the innovations, successes, opportunities, and challenges facing those who use the latest learning in financial services to increase the food security of poor families.

Addressing Food Security: What are the Approaches?

In Africa there has been increasing production but not enough to keep up with growing consumption. This has left Africa vulnerable to crisis. There are shifting perspectives on how best to help the food insecurity in Africa and elsewhere. Panelists will offer their strategies to addressing food insecurity, including increasing productivity of subsistence farming, improving competitiveness along staple value chains and widening trade and distribution. Following a recent, intensive food security study in West Africa, USAID and ACDI/VOCA will share some of their findings. Save the Children-Bolivia will provide an example of transitioning from a large food security program to a market linkage focus and moving from an implementing agency to a role as a facilitator in the value chain approach, while World Vision will describe its integrated sectoral approach to food security, as applied to a number of programs.

Monitoring Nutritional and Health Outcomes of Food Security, Economic Strengthening, and Livelihood Programs

Commonwealth North 1

Increasingly, donors, governments, and other funders are focusing on the nutritional outcomes of their programs, even when they are not centered explicitly on health and food security. Practitioners also need information on the population's food security and health outcomes to inform their decisions, monitor change, and evaluate impact. Food insecurity scales, such as the U.S. Household Food Security Survey Measure (HFSSM), comprise a set of inter-related questions and tools and are being applied and adapted for use in resource-poor settings. These scales can provide reliable measures of food insecurity in a variety of contexts, though not without challenges. This workshop will explore the monitoring and evaluation of nutrition,

food security, and health outcomes in economic strengthening and livelihood programs. Panelists will discuss the results of a multi-year research activity to develop a standard scale for comparable measurement of food insecurity in resource-poor settings and share case studies that project designers and managers can use as models.
